


A unique form of assessment known as Juries, in which every freshman and every sophomore must undergo an individual examination in every discipline that is conducted by members of the faculty plus visitors. Students receive material that they have never seen before and are given one hour to prepare their individual responses. Standing before the jury, they must deliver the analysis of their material and answer all questions posed by jury members. Results are judged as pass, fail, or excellent. All juries must be passed in order to graduate into the next level. Administering juries requires two full weeks of sessions, running from 8 am to 6 pm, including Saturdays.






The Library offers the American Academy's students and staff a refined environment, leading-edge technology, and a wide range of information resources. It holds a collection of physical (around 13 000 items) and electronic books and audio-video materials as well as board games; and provides access to much wider array of resources through subscriptions to various digital databases. The Library boasts many titles authored by the American Academy's teachers. The school community is encouraged to suggest resources for purchase – for their specific projects or just enrichment of the Library collection. In addition, the library staff delivers orientations and trainings on a scheduled as well as on demand basis and offers reference service and daily assistance in the use of library resources and technology. The Library also hosts an array of school events, such as lectures, presentations, seminars, and conferences.

SPECIAL COMPONEN

BESIDES THE SEVERAL UNIQUE FEATURES OF THE ACADEMY, THERE REMAIN A NUMBER OF SPECIAL ELEMENTS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION OFFERED HERE.



Pervasive use of technology: Since its inception back in 2001, the Academy has been equipped with multiple computers, all linked to a central server on which are stored the critical data regarding grades, comments, a database of students, the budget, and all correspondence. Teachers are equipped with their own classroom computers, while science classrooms currently have the use of document cameras and smart boards. Lessons and assignments are registered on the internet so that parents can monitor their children's homework. Besides those computers in the library, a computer room is equipped to instruct a full classroom in various technology programs. Grade books, scheduling, admissions, and all financial data are communicated and stored technologically.

A Parents' Council has been in place since the Academy's beginning. The Council, comprising representatives from all grades, meets regularly with the administration to keep apprised of ongoing issues and policies. They also participate in special programs, such as Parents' Night, Open Houses, and the like.

Advisories: Upon first entering the Academy, students are assigned a faculty advisor for the duration of their stay. Advisors distribute grades, communicate with parents, sit in on disciplinary conferences, and in general are granted special responsibility to monitor and advise.

Prefects: At the end of each year, the faculty appoints six seniors as prefects. Acting as the chief student representatives, each prefect is assigned one of the incoming freshmen advisories where they become student advisors. In addition, prefects assume responsibility for both arranging and monitoring special school events, such as convocation, field trips, "AAT days," and student social events.

TS OF THE ACADEMY

Interdisciplinary Senior Course on Great Ideas: All seniors participate in a full year, team taught interdisciplinary course, with certain faculty members designated as section leaders meeting three times each week and other faculty serving as double period lecturers once each week. In service since Academy inception, the subject matter includes Plato, Greek, and Georgian philosophers, Lucretius, Galileo, Leonardo da Vinci, Newton, Darwin, Freud, Einstein. Students read from primary sources and are required to record notes from the lectures.

American Textbooks: Besides Georgian and Russian, all courses taught use textbooks imported at considerable expense from America. These include many online resources that can be accessed from home.

Full-Time College Counselor: Monitoring and instruction in college application begins in the spring of the sophomore year and reaches its greatest intensity in the middle of senior year when college applications fall due. Besides the full time counselor, the Deputy Director takes part in placement activity, attending college conferences and sponsoring college fairs. Parents are invited to discuss college opportunities and financial aid.

A Fully Equipped Gymnasium: Our new gym provides for programs in football, basketball, volleyball, and rock climbing.





The five-year (grades 8-12) program of studies at the Academy is designed to produce well-rounded students who are prepared to enter local universities in Georgia as well as major universities in Europe and the United States. English is the primary language of instruction, except in classes studying Georgian and Russian where these languages are spoken exclusively.



OUR ACADEMIC PROGRAM MAKES THE FOLLOWING DEMANDS:

- Daily preparation will be stressed with homework in every subject, every day.
- Students will be expected to participate actively in every class, communicating not only with the teacher, but also with their peers.
- Wherever and whenever practicable, technology will be integrated in instruction.
- Frequent writing and assessment will be given high priority in all subjects.
- Attendance is mandatory. Excessive absenteeism can result in lower marks or the requirement that a student repeat the year.

The academic year is divided into two semesters, ending in a marking period. First and the third quarters occur at the halfway point of each semester at which time teachers communicate noteworthy student progress. Unless otherwise designated, classes meet four times per week with one double period. Students engage in physical and extracurricular activities throughout the year.

Our academic program differs from that of the typical Georgian program inasmuch as our courses are more intensive, meeting five hours each week in small classes throughout the year. They include a high degree of "hands on" activities, as well as the use of advanced textbooks and technology.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL (Grade 8)

In 2017, the American Academy introduced the Junior High School program (grade 8). The new program has been designed to foster students' social, emotional, and cognitive development and growth, which will enable them to enter high school more prepared for the challenges they usually face as freshman students.

Language of instruction is Georgian with gradual English immersion from the second quarter with the aim of getting students proficient by the end of the year. The teaching approach in Junior High has flexibility of applying different instructional strategies such as interactive classes, group work, etc.

The Junior High School program offers well-structured advisory, counseling, and the academic support programs. Each program addresses various issues that young students face at school; advisory program has a very well defined curriculum of study skills, whereas the academic support program is focused on not only assisting academically vulnerable students, but also developing other areas of their interest.

Admission to the Junior High is based on three tests - Georgian, English, and Math. After that, a personal interview takes place.

ENGLISH:

The purpose of this class is to ensure that its students have the English language skills not only to succeed but to excel during their high school years at the American Academy. To do this, the course seeks to provide them a firm foundation in the grammar, vocabulary, and critical and creative thinking skills that they will need. It also strives to develop the students' academic, organizational and interpersonal citizenship skills that will benefit them at the American Academy and beyond.

SCIENCES:

The course covers different topics in chemistry and biology. In this course, students will learn how to gather, analyze and interpret scientific data on chemistry and human anatomy. It also includes the academic and the technical vocabulary which are necessary for building success in these disciplines. Assignments include exercises and hands-on activities. Oral presentations will help the students to develop their argumentation and debate skills.

MATHEMATICS:

Algebra and Geometry are remarkable subjects, being both mathematically beautiful and having practical applications. The central goal of this course is to learn how to translate real-world applications to algebraic /geometric problems and then solve these problems using the acquired techniques of math. In this course some of the major concepts and theorems will be discussed. These include algebraic fractions, linear equations with one variable, various methods for solving systems of linear equations with two variables, types and properties of triangles, quadrilaterals, circles etc.



PHYSICS:

The course covers fundamental principles and processes of the physical world. One of the primary goals is to give students understanding of what physics is and what purpose it serves. Topics include basic concepts of motion, forces, energy, heat and electricity. Upon completion, students should be able to describe and explain physical concepts as well as know where they are applied. Students will be able to describe the reasons and causes behind physical phenomena as well as to apply these concepts to solve problems.

RUSSIAN:

This Russian language course begins with a systematic review of Russian grammar, concentrating on forms of nouns and verb systems. This course develops students' command of both oral and written Russian. It also develops students' skills at expressing themselves in the Russian language by intensive studying of the forms and aspects of nouns, verbs of motion, and essential vocabulary. The course trains students in all language skills combined with the study of cultural texts. Selected readings will serve as the basis for discussions, exercises, and compositions.

GEORGIAN:

The goal of this Georgian language course is to deepen students' knowledge of Georgian literature, familiarizing them with a variety of literature movements and styles. Its detailed learning of literate texts will help students in better understanding writers' concrete methods of creating their works. The course helps understanding Georgian literature in context of the world's culture. At the end of the course, students will have a deeper knowledge of grammar, orthography, punctuation and they will be able to use that knowledge to write and create essay. In addition, students will be able to discuss different styles and genres of literature works, use critical thinking, and follow/lead a discussion.

GERMAN:

The German program aims to give students a solid command of the language by the time they graduate. Students will be exposed to language-level appropriate vocabulary and grammar structures and develop listening, reading, writing, and speaking skills. Students will also be introduced to German culture, media, and the arts and be prepared to communicate practically in everyday situations. After completing the German course, American Academy students should be able to gain at least a B1 rating in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.



SOCIAL SCIENCES:

Social Sciences class aims to help students understand their cultural heritage and its respective place in the world. The course aims to train students to become better critical thinkers along with providing them with the necessary knowledge in the respective fields of history and geography. It focuses on teaching the basics of scientific research methodology and its approaches. The program involves various individual and group activities. The types of assignments include tests, presentations, argumentative essays and class discussions. Students extensively work with sources and various types of visual materials. Outside of the main textbook, the program utilizes the use of historical sources, both in Georgian and English languages.

ART:

In this class, students are familiarized with elements of visual and applied art, expressive methods, variety of techniques, materials and procedures. Students develop skills to embody and express different types of ideas. They use their imagination, observation, creativity towards different tasks. The course includes class and home works as well as individual pair, and group works. In addition, the course includes general school projects like working together with the drama club to create theatrical shows and costumes. At the end of the year, the art course will hold an exhibition.

MUSIC:

This is a one-year, once per week, introductory (music) course, which introduces students to the basic elements of music theory, literature, and history. Knowledge and understanding of core elements will develop in students a conscious perception of the world masterpieces and further promote the formation of their musical taste.

ADVISORY PROGRAM:

To promote students' social-emotional development, the Junior High School offers well-structured advisory and counseling programs, which will address various issues that young adolescents face. Advisory program has a very well defined curriculum of study skills. Each advisory group will have no more than ten students and advisory meetings will be held on a daily basis during the scheduled period of time.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT:

The academic Support program is focused not only on assisting academically vulnerable students but also on developing other areas of their interest.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM (GRADES 9-12)

Instruction in English will focus on gaining fluency and precision in the use of the language. Emphasis will be placed on grammar, learning the structure of the language and practicing sentence variation. Work on vocabulary is designed to enhance the range of both student comprehension and expression. Daily reading assignments include essays, poems, short stories, novels, and plays will be drawn from classics of British and American literature as well as world literature in translation. Stress will be placed on composition, learning the proper form of expository essays and keeping journals. Oral presentations will explore the use of classical rhetoric in argumentation and debate. SAT preparation will be arranged in after school sessions in the junior year.

Although instruction will cover the traditional topics in mathematics - algebra, trigonometry, geometry, and calculus - it will differ substantially in approach. Sometimes called "teaching to the problem," this approach stresses the process rather than the product of mathematical thinking. It invites students to ask their own questions and to formulate their own solutions. It encourages them to work in groups, solving problems together. The creative use of technology will be an important ingredient in negotiating this process, employing computers, calculators, and the Internet. At the same time, students will be exposed to the ancient and medieval roots of mathematics. And they will delve into the mysteries of probability by learning the wages of chance. In the senior year students who qualify can take the Advanced Placement course in calculus. The math department also holds special SAT preparations courses.

Students will spend the full four years of their secondary education studying their native language and literature. They will be drilled in use of correct grammar. They will expand their vocabularies and learn the conventions of proper Georgian usage, distinguishing between formal and informal speech. They will practice writing grammatical and stylistically correct formal essays, drawing upon typological comparison with the English language. They will engage in oral presentations and compete among themselves in special debates. Study of Georgian will encompass a thorough knowledge of the classic literature, both ancient and modern. The curriculum of Georgian literature is directly related with the masterpieces of world literature and cultural studies. This study will be integrated with the curriculum in history and will include consideration of all genres - poetry, essay, fiction, biography, drama, and film. Preparation for the national exam in Georgian will be included in the curriculum of the 11th and 12th grades.

Students will study Russian as their third language for gaining fluency in both reading and speech. They will read Russian classical and modern literature in the original. Classes will be given four times a week. Besides some of the classics of Russian literature, students will read current journals and newspapers, and will watch films in order to master their colloquial speech.

The study of history will cover major issues in the history of the world and of Georgia. Focus will be on understanding key events, key ideas, and key values through the history of mankind. The subject of history also considers raising awareness of current events and trends in the world. Historical study will involve readings, discussions writing assignments, presentations and preparation of at least one major project both on the individual and the class level. Assignments will be issued daily and the use of computer technologies with related skills constantly encouraged.

Studies will begin with the origins of humans, early forms of societies, the ancient civilizations from Egypt and Mesopotamia, India and China and American civilizations to Greece and Rome, including related periods in Georgia. Sophomore year will include the history of China and India, World Religions through the Middle Ages, again with related periods of Georgian history. Juniors will begin with the end of the medieval period and carry this up to modern times.

RELIGION - 1 semester

Seniors will study the major religions of the world - Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, and Paganism - as well as instances of primitive religions. Emphasis will be placed on knowledge of the history and the theology of each religion. Ethical implications of the various systems of beliefs will be explored. Students will consider selected moral dilemmas over which judgments might appropriately be rendered according to certain religions in question.

ART - 1 semester

Seniors will study the major works of art and architecture down through the centuries, enabling them to identify these works by period and creator. They will learn the fundamentals of composition in painting, the use of shadowing and perspective in drawing, the design and landscaping of great buildings. Students should emerge with the capacity to comment on the history, style, and composition of various works of art.

MUSIC - 1 semester

Seniors will study the history, structure, and style of great works and be able to identify these pieces by name and composer. They will study all types of music as well - classical, folk, jazz, modern, and opera. They will consider the mechanics of harmony, tonality, and discord. Students will learn to identify all instruments in a symphony orchestra.

Our biology course consists of six large units: cells, evolution, genetics, energy, matter and organization, and ecology, each composed with several sub themes logically connected. We also teach the basics of human anatomy and physiology, which are embedded in the course of study. We integrate textbooks and technology into our classes, using video, interactive animations, and internet resources to enrich the course. Our hands-on activities provide students the opportunities to make their own investigations, which help them to make the connections between biological concepts and everyday life.

The course in chemistry, covers most of the major topics of inorganic chemistry, including (but not limited to) basic chemical vocabulary, writing chemical formulas and balancing equations, periodic table and atomic structure, reaction types, stoichiometry, calorimetry, and kinetics.

The physics course is designed to give students a grounding in the major areas of physics and to give them an opportunity to apply their knowledge to real life situations. The course utilizes extensive discussions, problem solving, lab work and live presentations. At the end of the course students prepare a written report and presentation on a scientific topic of individual interest, through which they are able to demonstrate their understanding of physics.



Students are required to take PE during the freshman through sophomore years and will have the opportunity to engage in a variety of activities such as soccer, basketball, handball, volleyball, swimming, rock climbing, aerobics and dance.

SENIOR ELECTIVES - 1 YEAR

In 2008 the faculty proposed a Senior Elective program that would give students an opportunity to choose options that interested them. This year these courses include Filmmaking, Fundamentals, in Sociology, History of Western Philosophy, History of Art, History of Religion, History of Music, Introduction to Psychology, Personality Psychology, Introduction to Marketing, and Photography.



We are especially proud of our University Counseling Program. The American Academy is proud of the way it supports students in finding university placement. 90% of our graduates continue their studies to universities in the US, UK, Canada, and Europe. The number of students admitted to top-ranked universities and colleges is impressive, as is the amount of financial aid, which has been awarded to our students.

The university orientation program begins in the tenth grade with a career introduction. From the junior year, we begin the process of selecting universities, preparing documents, and submitting applications. Students and their parents attend group and individual meetings to discuss university options that are relevant to the student's personal and academic information. After completing the work on the list of universities, we start preparing and sending the necessary documents to universities.

American Academy offers its students SAT preparation courses at the beginning of their junior year. We provide after-school SAT sessions designed to prepare students for the test. 



EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

To achieve our goals we regard student participation in extracurricular activities as essential. These activities are scheduled at the end of the school day or on Saturdays, changing from year to year according to students' demand. Clubs function as independent student organizations or under supervision of a faculty advisor. Successful clubs in the past have been Drama, Debate, Intellectual Club, Chess, Model United Nations, Computers, Movie, and Archaeology Clubs, Music Club, Kendo (Japanese Fencing), Newspaper and the Saturday School Community Service program. The school also participates regularly in sports competitions with schools in the region. Students have input in school affairs through the student council and the senior prefect system.



ADMISSIONS

Entering Georgian or international students must have successfully completed seven years of schooling. Normally we fill all our available places during eight grade admissions. The school does, however, consider the application of transfer students, space permitting, in grades 9-11 but such students must demonstrate a high level of academic preparation and strong English skills. Parents must inform the school about students with special needs and in such cases, additional evaluations may be required to make sure that the school is equipped to provide the support needed.

Since Georgian is the primary language of instruction in the 8th grade in the first semester, entering students must demonstrate fluency during the entrance examination; students who are not fluent in Georgian cannot apply to the Junior High (grade 8) program. The language of instruction in higher grades (9-11) is English in both semesters.

Admission to the Academy is based on three tests, each of which is independently scored: a Georgian, an English, and a Math test administered by our Georgian, Math, and English departments respectively. Students applying to higher grades (9-11) take only English and Mathematics tests. After that, a personal interview takes place. Results from the tests and interview determine the final selection of the incoming Junior High (grade 8) student.

Prospective applicants must fill out the Online Application Form (the Online Application Form can be found in the Admissions section of the school's website) and upload the below documents to the Online Application Form's last page.



Additional Educational Services welcomes American Academy students and parents as well as families from other schools and institutions.






